

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
MISSION/WATER PROGRAMS







The Greek Community Documentation Project collects, documents, and preserves the cultural heritage of Tarpon Springs' Greek community, and educates the public about it though interpretive websites, programs, and exhibitions. The project is a key component of the City's Center for Gulf Coast Folklife, the mission of which is to identify, document, present, and preserve our unique traditional culture.

The online exhibition is built on the basic framework of the City of Tarpon Springs's permanent exhibition The Greek Community of Tarpon Springs, on display at the Tarpon Springs Heritage Museum. However, we have expanded upon it with substantially more images and other materials




Night in the Islands

Night in the Islands mirrors Greek panigiria with outdoor dining on the Sponge Docks, outstanding musical groups, and Greek social dancing. It has become an important community event—bringing together locals and visitors monthly April through October.


Folklife Apprenticeship Program







- In 2014 the National Register listed the Greektown Historic District—the nation's first non-indigenous Traditional Cultural Property (TCP) district. A property is eligible as a TCP "because of its association with cultural practices or beliefs of a living community that (a) are rooted in that community's history, and (b) are important in maintaining the continuing cultural identity of the community."
- Rose Hill Cemetery listed in 2017 for historical significance to African Americans in Tarpon Springs and Pinellas Co.
- Currently preparing nomination for Cycadia Cemetery as a TCP reflecting Greek American funerary traditions.

GREEKTOWN HISTORIC DISTRICT

Significant for continuity of traditional culture, extensive Greek infrastructure, and as the only Greek American community based on the sponge industry.




